Present: Mayor Sean Reardon, Sarah Hall, Juliet Walker, Bruce Menin, Brian Callahan, Steve Cole and Breanna Higgins.

CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL / PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Sean Reardon called the School Committee Business meeting of the Newburyport School Committee to order at 6:30 PM. Roll call found all members present. All those present stood for the Pledge of Allegiance. At this point in the meeting, Sarah Hall took over.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

<u>Ralph Orlando</u>, 4 William Hall Drive: Would like to express his sincere thanks and appreciation to Bruce Menin and Steve Cole for the many valuable contributions they have made over the past 20 years while serving on the School Committee. In addition, he feels public comments are no longer welcomed like they were in the past.

<u>Dave Hochheiser</u>, 2 Forrester Street: Thanked Bruce Menin and Steve Cole for their time serving on the School Committee. He feels the draft letter to Whittier should be strengthened. A vote on the Whittier project in January would be irresponsible, and more information is needed.

<u>Constance Preston</u>, 18 Atwood Street: Commended Bruce Menin and Steve Cole for serving on the School Committee; She has not heard any support so far for the Whittier project and the community feels they are being bullied to pay an unfair amount. She would like more information to help the community understand the cost of the proposed project, as well as costs to city if the vote doesn't pass.

<u>Stacey MacMillan</u>, 16 Highland Street: Thanked both Bruce Menin and Steve Cole for their years serving the School Committee. She echoes the feelings about Whittier and feels there is no information to help people understand. There needs to be an engaged process and more information so people can be informed voters.

<u>Andrea Weetman</u>: 183 High Street: Thanked Bruce Menin and Steve Cole for serving the School Committee. It is hard to become educated on the project and the amount of money doesn't make sense for Newburyport. There is a lack of transparency and communication. She is also concerned about a January vote, and feels most people do not know anything about the Whittier project.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

NHS student, Elizabeth Holmes, provided the student report that included the Scholastic Book Fair at the Bresnahan, upcoming winter concerts (Molin & NHS) and Kindness Month at the Nock (attached).

WHITTIER REGIONAL'S REP UPDATE

- Mayor Sean Reardon introduced Brett Murphy and Donna Holaday, Newburyport's representatives on the Whittier Regional School Committee. They answered many questions and shared details about the proposed Whittier building project.
- The next Whittier School Committee meeting will be held on December 13th; they will vote to decide if a special election should be held in January.
- The "Mayor's Office" section of Newburyport's website provides information regarding the proposed Whittier building project (see tab on the left hand side). Whittier's website also has a link to the building project information.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN REVIEW

- Superintendent Sean Gallagher provided a brief overview of the Capital Improvement Program (CIP). He reviewed a list of in-process / completed projects and their funding sources, as well as explained a list of FY24 district priorities.
- Steve Bergholm will provide a capital improvement plan update in February, as well as submit an application to MSBA that will include school roof repairs.
- Juliet Walker encouraged that "classroom space needs" be included in the budget "asks" while it is the budget season.

HIRING PROCESS UPDATE – DIRECTOR OF PUPIL SERVICES POSITION

Pam Kealey, HR Director, provided the following update:

- The district partnered with NESDEC to run the search and is following their process.
- The job has been posted on School Spring, as well as sent out through a variety of NESDEC's resources. Applications will be accepted until December 9th, when the posting will close.
- On November 15th three in-person focus groups for key stake holders were held, and were attended by 10-12 parents, 6 administrators, and 6-8 teachers (predominately Special Education).
- 126 responses were received for a survey that was run from November 9 thru November 22. NESDEC commented that this was a very strong response. Breakdown: 52% from parents; 31% from educators, and 17% "other" (i.e. OT, students, related service providers etc.)
- A candidate profile was created by NESDEC utilizing all the feedback from both the focus groups and survey responses.
- NESDEC supplied the process to create a screening committee that will include parents, community members, educators, and administrators.
- A public meeting will be held on December 5 at the Nock from 3-4PM with the NESDEC consultant, Dr. Michael Palladino, to explain the search process thus far, including establishing a screening committee. An Executive Session will be held at 4PM with the participants that were invited to be on the screening committee to discuss their role and responsibilities. Screening committee members and their qualifications will be publicly presented once they've committed to participate.
- Juliet Walker asked if the public meeting on December 5th can be recorded. Pam Kealey will provide a Zoom link.
- Breanna Higgins encourages that a school committee member and SEPAC member be included in the screening committee. Pam Kealey said there would be representation.

DRAFT COMMUNICATION TO WHITTIER REGIONAL VOTECH

Brian Callahan presented a draft communication to Whittier Regional's School Committee requesting a performance audit and a postponement of the January 23rd vote related to the proposed building project. The School Committee members discussed whether or not this type of communication should be sent from themselves or by the Mayor / City Council.

- Brian suggested a policy may be needed that states only the All Sports Boosters can have use of the Snack Shack for selling food etc at the games.
- Bruce asked if the Boosters were registered as a non-profit. Answer = no;
- Next meeting will be held at 4:30PM on December 18 with the PTO.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- <u>Trade Programs Dual Enrollment</u>: 110 high school students in grades 9-12 participated in dual enrollment last year. The Superintendent would like to pilot dual enrollment for the trade programs in 2025 with the Peterson School. This would provide an opportunity for upperclassmen to learn a trade. He provided an overview of the programs vision and goals, as well as what the program would look like (i.e. courses, assessments, costs). Breanna Higgins suggested also looking into the state's After Dark Program.
- <u>Superintendent's Advisory Council meeting</u>: The council has twenty members. Their recent meeting consisted of a budget workshop and an overview of dual enrollment for trade programs.

- The Superintendent distributed the PTO's financial report.

Bresnahan:

Before the Thanksgiving break, 2nd graders created their own Macy's Day Parade! After reading the book Balloons Over Broadway, students created their own "balloons" and were able to show them off to our younger students! We already can't wait for next year's parade!

Bresnahan students are participating in a Food Drive organized by NHS student Logan MacKnight. We are excited for the opportunity to give back to our community.

Across the school, we are working hard on Iready Math! If you were to walk into a first grade classroom last week, students were adding and subtracting number partners for 10. They worked in small groups to demonstrate the relationship between addition and subtraction to determine the unknown whole number in an addition or subtraction equation. They could explain how to use visual models (10-frames, and number bonds) to find missing number partners for 10 and describe how to record number partners for 10 in a number bond and use it to write up to four related addition and subtraction equations. Great work first graders, and props to the grade 1 teachers as well!

Mr. RM will lead a sing along downtown on Invitation Night on Friday December 8th at 5:15 in front of the big tree. All Bresnahan families are invited to attend!

- Pam Kealey, Director of Human Resources, provided an update regarding the next steps for upcoming meetings on December 19 and January 8 (tentative date). Future meetings will involve reviewing and choosing applicants, as well as developing interview questions.
- Screening Committee members will include Andi Egmont (NYS Director/Community Partner), Kristen Farrell (SEPAC Member/Parent Nock-Molin/Nbpt Commission on Disabilities/ASL), Bruce Menin (School Committee/Community Member), Michael Nazarro (District BCBA), Jamie Calisi (NHS Adjustment Counselor), Sherry Denby (Reading Teacher Nock/Molin), Jillian Grille (District Physical Therapist), Renee Toth (SEPAC member/NHS Parent/Educational Advocate), Breanna McCarthy (Bresnahan Parent/Corporate Experience Building Teams), Melanie Beaulier (SEPAC Member/Parent Nock-Molin), Nick Markos (Principal Nock Middle School), Deb O'Connor (Interim Director of Pupil Service)
- Juliet Walker and Breanna Higgins questioned Bruce Menin representing the School Committee as he was leaving. Sarah Hall explained that a new person will be invited to participate in January.
- Juliet Walker would like a list of screening committee members and their roles.

PROPOSED WHITTIER BUILDING PROJECT UPDATE

- Mayor Sean Reardon provided an update regarding the recently held MSBA meeting. They voted 5-0 to move the Whittier project to the build process. Now Whittier has 120 days to hold a vote within the 11 sending communities. He also noted MSBA mentioned the Whittier project proposal was the third vocational project in a row where member communities stated they were not informed of the building project.
- Many towns sent letters to slow down and/or pause the project / vote, and many people voiced concerns via public comments. The Whittier School Committee voted 11-3 in favor of holding a special vote in the 11 sending communities on January 23 from 11AM-7PM.
- Bruce Menin asked what would happen if the vote fails. Mayor Reardon said the project would not move forward and hears that Whittier will then go for renovations.
- Juliet Walker finds the lack of communications discouraging.
- Several members suggested Whittier SC Reps should begin to attend Newburyport SC meetings periodically.

SUBCOMMITTEE UPDATES

Finance Subcommittee

• Brian Callahan stated their recent meeting centered around the Whittier Building Project, as well as recognition for Steve Cole as this was his final meeting.

Policy Subcommittee

Juliet Walker stated all policies up to Chapter "L" have been reviewed. The MASC representative (Dorothy Presser) provided her recommendations prior to retiring at the end of December. Chapters A thru D were recently updated and are available on the website in a PDF format. They are exploring using MASC to host our policies in a searchable database.

Fundraising Advisory Committee

- Brian Callahan stated the committee recently met with John Ricci, Treasurer of the PTO to learn about their fundraising activities and disbursements. Conversation topics included field trip busing and teacher "wish lists".
- Brian Callahan suggested any standard office supply should be a "budget" item and not obtained via parents/PTO (i.e. via a wish list).
- The next meeting will be held on January 22 to interview the Athletic Department.

CISL Subcommittee:

- Breanna Higgins reported that CISL held their first meeting in October. The meeting consisted of new member introductions, a recap of the School Committee summer retreat, and an overview of the Early Literacy Screening Process.
- Juliet Walker stated that each school presented their School Improvement Plan (SIP) at the November meeting (presentation details in the packet).

January 16, 2024

Welcome / Opening Comments / Introductions

Mayor Reardon welcomed everyone to the meeting. He introduced the school committee members and thanked Sarah Hall for coordinating the retreat. Mayor Reardon introduced Michelle McNulty, of Murphy, Lamere & Murphy and thanked her for providing this workshop.

Newburyport School Committee Workshop

Facilitator: Michelle McNulty, Esq.

A presentation was provided that covered (1) roles of the school committee, (2) conflict of interest issues, and (3) school committee communications. After an introduction of general law, the following areas were discussed:

Role of the School Committee

- Educational goals & policy
 - School Committee establishes; Superintendent implements
- Approving the budget
- Hiring / Contracting
 - SC selects and sets terms for a Superintendent, Business Manager & Special Ed Director
 - SC creates the Ass't Superintendent position, and approves compensation & hiring
 - Superintendent brings the candidates to the School Committee
 - Appoints/approves new hires
- Day to Day operations handled by the Superintendent and administrators (i.e. personnel matters, evaluations, student services issues)
- Review of "body" vrs individual, access to information, visits to schools, and directives to faculty/staff, and inquiries of information

Conflict of Interest Issues

- Review of prohibited actions
- Areas of risks, along with examples
- Ethics Training
- Personal Liability
- Recusal

School Committee Communication

- Reminder that all communications are public
- Utilize official school email
- Confidentiality
- Ethics Violations
- Open Meeting Law considerations
- Social Media
- Review everything before sending / posting

MASC Code Of Ethics

Leadership Workshop Facilitator: Dr. Anthony Bent

This workshop included various group exercises and discussions related to roles and responsibilities of the school committee, strong leadership, the importance of communication and working together.

- Tony reviewed three quotes, which was followed by a discussion about feelings, emotion and information.
- Leadership is about being the adult in the room. During this exercise, words that were identified are: mature, smart, responsible, experience, respect, and model (example).
- Who are we? School committee members were divided into pairs to learn more about each other. Each pair was given 10 minutes to learn the following: (1) Where did you grow up? (2) Why are you on the school committee? and (3) Share something nobody knows about you. Afterwards, each person shared what they had learned.
- Tony briefly reviewed the three big roles and responsibilities of the School Committee: Superintendent, budget and policies. He suggested that the average length of a business meeting should be 2 hours. Any more than that, people will get tired and have less ability

to work together as a team. Tony also reminded members not to create school committee goals that are the same as the strategic plan. And, that members need to be "governing" and not "managing" based on your experience and background.

Book suggestion: The Governance Core by Davis Campbell and Michael Fullan

- School Committee members should be advocates for it's district; talk to the community about how good the schools are doing, or how well the students are performing or the superintendent etc.
- Superintendents need to lead, and be seen leading.
- Leadership Hourglass Exercise: Tony split the members into two groups. Both groups read the handout, "The Leadership Hourglass". They were given a few minutes to review the 16 statements, and identify the statement that most jumps out to them. Each person shared their choice in a group discussion with Tony.
- Working Together Exercise: Each person was asked (1) What is your super power? and (2) If you believe in continuous improvement, how can you be a better School Committee member? A group discussion followed.
 - Book suggestion: Dare To Lead

Questions:

Juliet Walker asked if Tony had any good resources for self-assessment. He will send some information to Sean Gallagher. Sarah Hall suggested this could be a topic at the summer retreat.

Sean Gallagher asked if other School Committees have utilized "The Governance Core" book. Yes, and Tony feels all members should have this book as a reference.

School Committee SMART Goals Review

- <u>Newsletter</u>: Sarah Hall reported that the newsletter was going well, and she has received positive feedback. She explained the distribution schedule and topics she includes.
 - Juliet Walker asked if School Committee members can add things to the newsletter. Yes.
 - Brian Callahan asked if the newsletter was posted on the website, and suggested it could be promoted on the City's website. Sarah stated the plan is to have it on the website, and to have an archive.
 - Sarah Hall is trying to work a way for people outside the district to be able to see the newsletter (i.e. community members and other non-parents)
 - Andrew Boger suggested adding district-wide meetings to the newsletter.
 - Kathleen Shaw asked if the newsletter was available in other languages. Yes, the website and Smore translates.
- <u>Budget Workshops</u>: Sarah Hall stated that School Committee members attended the workshops. The staff did a lot of work, but the workshops weren't well attended.

- Breanna Higgins suggested doing a survey; She also suggested doing one or two workshops with targeted invites (i.e. PTO, Rotary or other community groups)
- Juliet Walker would like to try the workshop again, obtain input from a survey, and maybe get the school councils to attend a workshop.
- <u>Policy Audit:</u> Juliet Walker stated the policy audit with MASC was wrapped up in December. There will be a staff person at MASC to keep helping us if needed. Most changes up to Section H have been adopted, and Sections I, J, and L still to do. They are still on track to finish by June.

Communications Subcommittee

- Juliet Walker would like to pursue creating a Communications Subcommittee.
- There was a brief discussion to share ideas as to what the purpose will be, and what role this committee would have.
- Juliet Walker will draft a proposal and description for the January 16th School Committee meeting.

2024 Subcommittee List

- Breanna Higgins is enable to be on two subcommittee groups (CISL and Policy). After a group discussion, it was decided Breanna will stay on the Policy Subcommittee, and Juliet Walker will be on CISL.
- Sarah Hall asked Joanne Yelle to modify the 2024 Subcommittee list and send it to Mayor Reardon for his review before including it in the packet for the next meeting.



This workshop will provide several samples of tools for assessing using this model, action steps needed to implement it, and a discussion of potential pitfalls and how to avoid them. 5) Trauma Sensitive Teaching Practices, Re-imagine teacher and learning, skills based grading

Paul is in his 18th year teaching Physics, 11th in Newburyport. Paul arrived at the Learning Progression Model after being in the first cohort of Skills Based Grading with Billie Donegan in 2019. Paul implemented Skills Based Learning and found that, while the concepts behind the methodology were helpful, in implementation the workload was overwhelming, and students often looked to having redo opportunities instead of trying their best the first time. The Learning Progression Model Paul uses is adapted from other Science teachers, and is a step forward in Paul's progression in finding ways to assess student work.

O7 INTERVENING IN "THAT MOMENT" PRESENTED BY: ERIC SCHILDGE

It can be hard to know how to intervene when a classroom conversation becomes heated and antagonistic. Perhaps a student says something hurtful or someone expresses a strong feeling or personal conviction that conflicts with their classmates. In this session, we will go over a tool for responding in the moment when conversations go sideways. We will practice a technique called PSA (Purpose, Slip, Alternative) and reflect on our experiences with past interventions. This framework is broadly applicable, and it can often help to defuse tensions and build community before a conflict escalates and bubbles over outside the classroom. *5) Trauma Sensitive Teaching Practices, 9) Student Voice, 13) Communication, 14) Family Engagement*

Eric teaches 8th Grade ELA on the Crimson Team and serves as the Nock Middle School Dialogue Coordinator. Outside of school, he works as an Associate for Essential Partners, where he helps teachers around the country develop tools to help get students, staff, and families talking about what matters most to them and their communities.

OS SMALL CHANGES = BIG IMPACT: SUPPORTING THE WHOLE STUDENT IN CREATING SAFE, SUPPORTIVE, & INCLUSIVE SCHOOLS, PRESENTED BY: ERIN RICH, OT

Gather with colleagues from across the district to learn the "Whole-Child Approach" to creating a safe, supportive, and inclusive school culture. We will discuss the importance of co-regulation and a neuro-diverse-affirming approach to engaging our students. Together, we'll collaborate to create a menu of small interventions and practices that can have a big impact on engaging disengaged or dysregulated learners. **Note:** This workshop is primarily designed for those who haven't taken the Lesley Trauma classes yet or who took them several years ago and would like a refresher.

As an Occupational Therapist, Erin has been in the district since 2005, mostly supporting students and teams in grades 4 and up. I am also a graduate instructor at the Lesley Institute for Trauma Sensitivity (LIFTS), where we promote safe, supportive, and inclusive schools. My favorite part of both my roles is partnering and collaborating with colleagues and caregivers to ensure that the diverse needs of our students are met so that they can experience success.


Kristin Callahan has spent her career in elementary education. She taught literacy in second grade for 15 years and provides literature support to second and third graders.
